

THE HUMANITARIAN OBSERVATORY

is an organized space where participants, representing multiple actors across the humanitarian arena, discuss a variety of topics in relation to trends and processes in humanitarian governance and effect change where identified in their given contexts.

Humanitarian governance refers to how multiple and diverse actors work together (or not) to address humanitarian needs. Collaboration processes between these different actors are often associated with many challenges, including the effectiveness of aid, accountability, trust and the localization of aid.

Beyond international trends, it is important to look at what can be done to improve humanitarian governance considering specific regional and national contexts. The Humanitarian Observatory is a method that can be used to address this need.
